Tips for teaching times tables at home

- Hang times tables up where your child can see them (the kitchen, their bedroom, the bathroom)
- Play games which involve using timetables (here are some links with ideas and games, you can also get apps for tablets <u>https://www.theschoolrun.com/top-times-tables-games</u> <u>https://www.topmarks.co.uk/maths-games/7-11-years/times-tables</u> <u>https://www.timestables.co.uk/games/</u>)

- Teach them some tricks for remembering their times tables (some ideas can be found here <u>https://www.mathsisfun.com/multiplication-tips-tricks.html</u>)
- Draw a Waldorf flower (One for the creative children. Children start this activity by drawing the centre of the flower, in which they write a number between 2 and 12. They then draw 12 petals around the centre, with each petal containing the numbers 1 through 12. The last step is to draw another set of 12 petals which contain the centre number multiplied by each petal in the inner circle.)



• Remember to reward your child for rehearsing and succeeding in their times tables
